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Identify, Teach and Treat (IT2) Overview

 To implement health-system-wide screening for UI in women in primary care followed by automated access to online education about UI subtypes and treatments

Project team

• Urogynecology, primary care internal medicine, clinical quality, information technology, analytics and statistics, program management

Target population

• Women 18 years of age and older seeking routine ambulatory primary and preventive care

Main intervention components


- Routine screening for annual and preventive care visits
- Access to interactive, online education about UI subtypes and treatments
- Clinician point-of-care resources and decision support





Implementation Need


- "Hardwiring" urinary incontinence screening into routine primary care requires imbedded and reliable workflows
- Advantages to using automated patient questionnaire
 - Already in use for other registration and clinical content
 - Allows for completion prior to office visit
 - Does not require staff/clinician time
 - Enables pre-visit use of online educational content
 - Possibly better patient disclosure of symptoms





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Successes

Uptake by patients is high

- Of initial 4589 patients eligible for screening 3871 (84%) completed screening
- 2523 (65%) of screenings done with pre-visit questionnaire
- 1348 (35%) were screened in the office

Questionnaire respondents more likely to indicate help wanted

- 13.2% of pre-visit questionnaire respondents indicated they had bothersome UI and wanted help
- 6.8% of office screening respondents indicated bothersome UI and wanted help

What is WiserCare ?

 Digital software partner who has developed an online patient/clinician program that provides education for urge and stress urinary incontinence, then provides best fit for treatment options based on patient feedback, preferences, and clinical guidelines.

How does WiserCare help patients and clinicians?

- Helps prepare the patient for the upcoming visit through education about urinary incontinence, offering care options to consider along with personal preferences for care prior to the clinician appointment.
- Provides the clinician with a patient-centric report electronically filed into the patient's medical record. This streamlines urinary incontinence discussion at the point of care, allowing for efficient focus on next steps in care.

What does the WiserCare process look like?

Patient appt. Provider-centric Patient screened Patient completes Patient-centric WiserCare report supported by WiserCare *positive* for urinary WiserCare report WiserCare electronically sent to online program prior to available for incontinence in patient's medical record provider report **MyChart** clinician appt. patient download
